

Kendall County Vaccination Clinic Information

General Information:

Kendall County Health Department is prepared to begin providing the COVID-19 vaccine to the following individuals:

1. District 202 staff who live in Kendall County
2. District 202 staff who work at the following schools located in Kendall County: Charles Reed Elementary, Thomas Jefferson Elementary, Aux Sable Middle School, and Plainfield South High School.

Appointments are limited at this time. Staff who meet the criteria above should follow the directions below to register for an appointment. The goal is to get everyone through as fast as they can as long as there is adequate vaccine supplies. At this time, the vaccine clinic will have the Moderna vaccine.

Location:

651 Prairie Point Dr.

Yorkville, IL 60560

Enter the building at the front doors.

Dates:

The clinic will start the week of February 1st and continue as doses are available.

Hours:

8:45 AM – 4:00 PM

Scheduling appointment:

Staff must use the link below to register for their appointment. Remember, appointments are limited at this time. Kendall Co. is adding appointments daily based on vaccine availability. Only schedule your first appointment for now. You will be required to schedule your second dose through Kendall Co. at a later time.

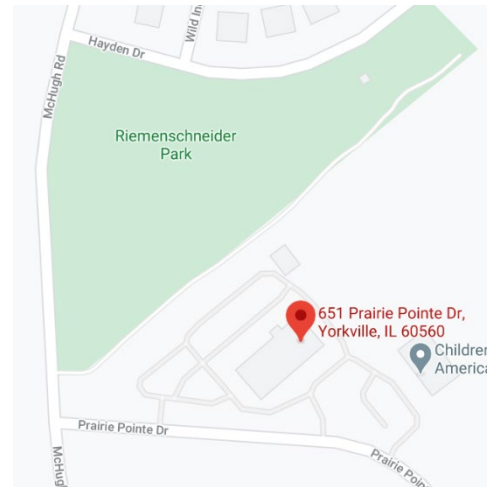
Scheduling Your Appointment Around the Work Day:

School staff who directly work with students must try to schedule their appointment during a time when they are not in-person with students. This can be before school starts, in the afternoon when all students are home, or on Wednesdays when students are all participating in Remote Learning. If a staff member schedules a vaccine during Remote Learning time, they must post asynchronous lessons for their students. Staff must consider the amount of time to travel to the site and the time needed for the actual appointment (approximately 15 min).

Day of the Appointment?

Staff should arrive during the 30-minute window and anticipate waiting 15 minutes post-vaccination to ensure no adverse effects. All staff must either print out the proof of registration page or be prepared to share a snapshot of the page on their phone. In addition to the proof of registration, staff must also bring

- Staff who live in Kendall Co. need to bring proof that they live in Kendall County and their current school ID.
- Staff who work at schools located in Kendall Co. (TJ, CR, AS, PSHS) must bring their staff ID with their school name.

Can I get the vaccine if I had COVID?

You can get the vaccine even if you have had COVID in the past 90 days. The only time you need to wait the 90 days is if you received passive antibody therapy as a treatment for COVID.

Can I get the vaccine if I am currently quarantining?

You should not get the vaccine if you are currently under a COVID quarantine.

How long does the appointment take?

Staff should plan for 30 minutes. Anticipate to wait 15 minutes after you receive your vaccine.

What if I have allergies?

We recommend you consult with your personal physician prior to getting the vaccine.

Can I get the vaccine if I am pregnant or breastfeeding?

We recommend that you consult with your personal physician prior to getting the vaccine.

Do I need to quarantine if I am exposed to someone with COVID-19 after I get my first or second dose of the vaccine?

Yes. At this time, the direction is that all individuals must still quarantine if they are exposed to an individual with COVID-19 even if they had the vaccine.

Some typical reactions to the vaccine from the trials:

The most common reaction is pain at the injection site, which occurs in about 80% of patients. In the study of 43,000 patients, other common symptoms fatigue (>60%), headache (>50%), muscle pain (>30%), chills (>30%), joint pain (>20%) and fever (>10%). While the symptoms were uncomfortable, and at times intense, the participants said they often went away after a day. If you previously had COVID-19, you may experience minor symptoms including a fever and body aches.

The symptoms seem to be more severe with the second dose but it remains important to get the second dose in order to obtain the immunity response to protect you from the actual infection. It is important to understand that these are expected reactions from stimulating your immune system and not an actual COVID-19 infection. Most of these were from the second vaccine dose.
